Advent Reflections **December 7, 2019**



"Good things come to those who wait."

Today's reading had me thinking about how the speed of Time is relative to the current circumstances in our lives and what we are anticipating. If something dreadful is approaching (April 15th, work deadlines, dental appointments, Mondays, the last day of summer vacation), time seems to fly at twice its regular speed. If something wonderful is ahead (a new baby in the family, a wedding, Holidays, and the start of summer vacation), time seems to slow down. Time also travels exponentially slower when we find ourselves in difficult situations (during labor, sitting in the dentist's chair, [I presume] sitting in detention, and health issues). When time is passing slowly, we wish we could speed it up to get past the current hardships and get to better times. When time is flying, we wish we could slow it down. But we can't do either and that's okay; we don't have to. In this Reading we are assured that there will be better times ahead. We can know that the Lord will provide good things to us. By understanding this concept, we can better control our perception of Time and let Time simply pass.

In today's reading, I was reminded of two things my mother told me when I was young. "Patience is a Virtue" and "All things come in God's Time." What was true then is true now. The Lord tells us in today's Reading, that He will see us through our times of trial. There is no need to be fretful; He will provide for our needs. In today's encouraging Psalm, we are told "Blessed are all who wait for the Lord." May we all appreciate every moment we are given.

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Reading 1 IS 30:19-21, 23-26

Thus says the Lord GOD, the Holy One of Israel: O people of Zion, who dwell in Jerusalem, no more will you weep; He will be gracious to you when you cry out, as soon as he hears he will answer you. Gospel <u>MT 9:35–10:1, 5A, 6-8</u>

Jesus went around to all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Gospel of the Kingdom, and curing every disease and illness. At the sight of the crowds, his heart was moved with pity for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest."

Then he summoned his Twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits to drive them out and to cure every disease and every illness. Jesus sent out these twelve after instructing them thus,
