
# Advent Reflections December 9, 2019



Advent is universally regarded by Christians as a time of anticipation...a time of hope that the short, dark days of our external world during this season will not diminish our interior light, that current separations will be breached through reunions, that waiting in worry for the future will be replaced with peace in the here and now...that what seems impossible can, in fact, become possible. Today's readings remind us of our long history as a hope-filled people...and our need for confidence in ultimate fulfillment of our hope.

The reading from the book of Genesis speaks of a serious breach in relationship between God and mankind...a breach caused by man himself, a breach that seems impossible to mend. Yet the one wounded---our all-loving Father---promises a future restoration, with a plan for bringing this restoration to fruition.

How many times have we ourselves caused a breach in our relationships through thoughtless words or actions...and because of pride or fear failed to extend---or accept---a heartfelt attempt for restoration or relationship?

The responsorial psalm calls us to trust and hope...trust that in acknowledging the unchanging and unfailing love, kindness and greatness of our Creator, our hope that a true and lasting reconciliation with Him will not be in vain.

Have we ever stopped trying...given up on the hope of mending a broken relationship...subscribed to the worldly perspective that "people can never change"?

The letter of St. Paul to the Ephesians reminds us that our hope lies in remembering the blessings we have *already* received...a hope that brings confidence that having been chosen by God we can be assured of continued

blessings...even if we don't recognize the blessings as such right now.

Do we succumb to sadness and despondency when things don't go our way, or do we look at the challenges of our lives through the lens of hope, confident that even our trials ultimately bring blessings that we cannot yet recognize?

Finally, the Gospel reading from St. Luke reminds us that no matter how unlikely a situation might seem...nothing is impossible with God! We need to hold fast to our conviction that the seemingly most improbable, impossible situation can be healed in the most improbable, impossible way by our God of possibilities.

### Gospel LK 1:26-38

He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of his Kingdom there will be no end."
