
Lenten Reflections March 13, 2020

Jealousy, greed and vengeance are themes in today's readings. Joseph's brothers are jealous of him because his father seems to love him more. So, they plot to kill him. Later, thinking twice they sell him into slavery instead. Jesus tells a parable in which tenant farmers are jealous of their master and are also greedy for his possessions. While the landowner is away and once the vineyard begins producing, the tenants greedily seize and terrorize the servants, even killing the landowner's son. The greed and jealousy prevent the brothers and the tenants from seeing with clear vision who it is that God has sent them. Both Joseph and the landowner are rejected.

Two separate reflections encompass me. You and I also can reject those who are sent our way whether they have something much to share with us or not. The question remains the same. Do we look beyond our own feelings, desires, jealousies, or do we give in to them and prevent God's work from occurring?

Of course, the brothers and tenants represent us when we forget God and forget ourselves. We need to remember who we are and take the time to spend with our God. Yet, there are times when we still find ourselves being jealous of another's success. There are times when we act differently because no one is watching. And there are times when I/We still think, "I deserve this." "Deserve" means entitlement. On my best days when I catch myself thinking I deserve something, I pull back. I remind myself I'm not put here on Earth to get what's mine but to do what God needs of me.

Friday of the Second Week of Lent Lectionary: 234

Reading 1 GN 37:3-4, 12-13A, 17B-28A

Israel loved Joseph best of all his sons, for he was the child of his old age; and he had made him a long tunic.

When his brothers saw that their father loved him best of all his sons, they hated him so much that they would not even greet him.

One day, when his brothers had gone to pasture their father's flocks at Shechem, Israel said to Joseph, "Your brothers, you know, are tending our flocks at Shechem. Get ready; I will send you to them."

So Joseph went after his brothers and caught up with them in Dothan. They noticed him from a distance, and before he came up to them, they plotted to kill him. They said to one another: "Here comes that master dreamer! Come on, let us kill him and throw him into one of the cisterns here; we could say that a wild beast devoured him. We shall then see what comes of his dreams."

When Reuben heard this,
he tried to save him from their hands, saying,
"We must not take his life.
Instead of shedding blood," he continued,
"just throw him into that cistern there in the desert;
but do not kill him outright."
His purpose was to rescue him from their hands
and return him to his father.
So when Joseph came up to them,
they stripped him of the long tunic he had on;
then they took him and threw him into the cistern,
which was empty and dry.

They then sat down to their meal.

Looking up, they saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead, their camels laden with gum, balm and resin to be taken down to Egypt.

Judah said to his brothers:

"What is to be gained by killing our brother and concealing his blood? Rather, let us sell him to these Ishmaelites, instead of doing away with him ourselves.

After all, he is our brother, our own flesh."

His brothers agreed.

They sold Joseph to the Ishmaelites for twenty pieces of silver.

Jesus said to them, "Did you never read in the Scriptures:

The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; by the Lord has this been done, and it is wonderful in our eyes?

Therefore, I say to you,
the Kingdom of God will be taken away from you
and given to a people that will produce its fruit."
When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables,
they knew that he was speaking about them.
And although they were attempting to arrest him,
they feared the crowds, for they regarded him as a prophet.
