
Lenten Reflections March 2, 2020

I used to live and work in downtown Manhattan and if you've ever been to visit you know that on every turn it is very possible to encounter a homeless human. Often during my daily commute, like many New Yorkers, I found myself becoming bothered and even inconvenienced by yet another person begging me for money. When trying to survive the Manhattan hustle it is easy to get angry by the "beggars" being in our way as we rush to work and also to accumulate a mindset thinking "Can't they just get a job?"

Well, it wasn't until one morning on my daily commute when the person sitting next to me severely changed my mindset. She looked fatigued, her clothes were worn, and she smelled as if she hadn't showered in days. Typically, the norm is to just ignore "them," but on this day the person I was trying to avoid actually struck up a conversation with me. I was hesitant at first to engage, but eventually learned she was also on her way to work just like me. She had 3 children, a burdensome amount of debt, and had recently escaped serious domestic violence. She had been staying in a women's and children's shelter and then couldn't afford the minimum weekly payment so was asked to leave the shelter and found herself and kids on the street. I couldn't help her much that day but gave her whatever cash I had in hand and made it a mission to help those in need. As she left, I felt shocked. I realized that being homeless wasn't necessarily about not having a job, but rather being a victim of serious life changing circumstances that can completely alter our life overnight and possibly not being able to receive government assistance to afford a Manhattan lifestyle. I knew at this point I had to help in whatever way I could. Although it wasn't much, I began packing sandwiches in my purse and would walk around the city distributing them daily during my lunch breaks. Just to see each person's

shock and smile really brightened my day and made me feel like I made a difference.

So, when I moved into New Jersey I took on an even bigger mission to help as many large help centers as I could. I began contacting every help center in the area, collected large amounts of donations and set up appointments to distribute them. On every single visit I make a point to talk to some of the occupants because I feel there is so much to learn. I open myself to be a listening ear and encourage them as much as I can. The stories I learn from every individual are absolutely mind blowing. One family could have escaped domestic violence, while the person next to them was the CEO of a company who went bankrupt and suddenly could no longer afford their living situation. It was easy to suddenly understand that my "can't they just get a job" mindset was absolutely mistaken and rather should have been set to "how can I help?"

Rich or poor we are all humans and we never know when our comfortable lifestyle can greatly be flipped upside down the next day. I hope this message will encourage someone to bring donations to a local shelter, ask how we can volunteer, and most importantly the next time we meet someone who may seem to have a less fortunate lifestyle than we do, have a listening ear and share encouraging support.

but the righteous to eternal life."
