Lenten Reflections March 8, 2019



"If Lent is springtime then our fast must lead us to bring life to others" (2017)

The Church recognizes the season of Lent as 'this time'; but a time that should be accompanied with acts of charity, love and goodness. Fasting from food is acceptable to God only when we refrain from being unkind, blaming others, lack of empathy, self-fulfillment only, entitlement and blindness to all our true blessings that surround us (I fall victim to this). The powerful statement on fasting about food (or things) is for me more metaphorical and more about our actions of charity. By fasting we are reminded of our commitment to God and His word, and to refrain from our acts of intolerance, lack of empathy and refraining from compassion, love and devotion to God. Because fasting to please God is not the goal, the fast is about understanding real sacrifice through recognizing how it will impact others in our decisions, our love and our empathy of others and their day to day lives.

There are few rewards more virtuous then the one of true sacrifice of the things we desire and to give that time, energy and love to others. It must not be just symbolic, yet tangible and real through our virtuous acts.

This, rather, is the fasting that I wish:
releasing those bound unjustly,
untying the thongs of the yoke;
Setting free the oppressed,
breaking every yoke;
Sharing your bread with the hungry,
sheltering the oppressed and the homeless;
Clothing the naked when you see them,
and not turning your back on your own.

Reading 1 IS 58:1-9A

Thus says the Lord GOD:
Cry out full-throated and unsparingly,
lift up your voice like a trumpet blast;

This, rather, is the fasting that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; Setting free the oppressed, breaking every yoke; Sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless; Clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall quickly be healed; Your vindication shall go before you, and the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer, you shall cry for help, and he will say: Here I am!
