Lenten Reflections March 9, 2020

Today's reading is most interesting. Upon reflection, I think most folks would say it is the Golden Rule reframed. The Golden Rule is generic enough for most religious traditions to find common ground within their values and belief systems. Do unto others as you would have others do unto you.

When we unpack the words of Lk. 6:36-38, we see something far more prescriptive, far more challenging than the platitude that the Golden Rule has too often become. Jesus is instructing his disciples (and us) to be merciful as God is merciful. Indeed, most people are merciful when they volunteer, or donate to a food pantry, or give someone a helping hand or contribute financially to disaster relief as well as many varied other ways to do good and help to make life a bit better for others. This is all good but is it enough?

Doing good works, though merciful, does not necessarily require us to step out of our comfort zone. However, when we take Jesus' challenge seriously that to be merciful means to stop judging, criticizing, and condemning others, we are being asked to stand in radical equality with others. Perhaps most challenging is Jesus' instruction to forgive those who have hurt us even when not requested. This kind of forgiveness requires that we stop judging, criticizing, or condemning the other person. Most of us have experienced been hurt by another, and in turn, we also have hurt people in our lives. Consider the outcome when someone forgives us for the pain we have caused them. We often experience a sense of gratitude, relief, and the ability to move on. With forgiveness comes the ability to release anger, hurt and not ruminate on the past. Forgiveness is a gift that is returned tenfold.

Lent is an opportunity to practice 'prescriptive mercy' and ask for forgiveness if we have hurt someone and offer forgiveness to someone who has hurt us but with no strings attached. Forgiveness become a merciful gift, freely given and freely received.
